This is a community-driven master plan with project partnership between many organizations, including the City of Knoxville, non-profit organizations, the University of Tennessee, KUB, and the State of Tennessee Department of Agriculture. The UFMP will guide the City and County to maintain, preserve, and expand the urban forest and tree canopy. Kasey also co-led the initiative to submit the Master Plan, and has received a large grant from the Inflation Reduction Act. This grant will provide funding and staff, including workforce development, as well as tree plantings, education and outreach in underserved communities in Knoxville.
